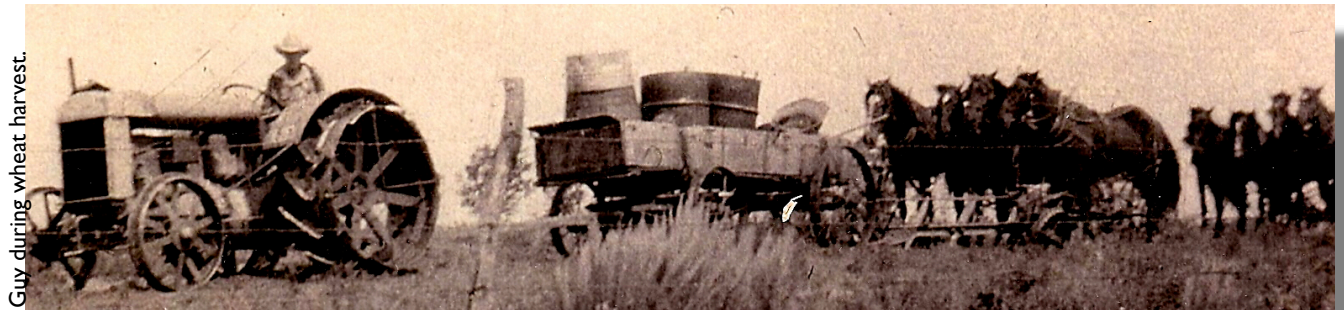

TWO PIONEER FAMILY'S COMBINED IMPACTS LIVE ON

One spring day in May 1882, three orphan Schickedanz boys -- Wilhelm, 24, Thomas, 17, and August, 16 -- walked from Frankfurt on the Main, Germany, toward Antwerp, Belgium, leaving their German homeland for an American adventure.

Some 23 days later they arrived in New York harbor on the steamer, Daniel Stirnmann. With less than a dollar between them, they headed west, ultimately homesteading in the Oklahoma Territory.

August (Guy's father) homesteaded southwest of Fargo in 1901, while another immigrant, George Schneider, (Faye's father) rented a farm near Tangier in 1905.

Both two pioneer families prized church and education. George Schneider was a member of the Fargo School Board for many years and helped establish Future Farmers of America Chapters in Oklahoma. August Schickedanz was a founding member of Liberty Baptist Church where Guy is still a deacon today.

Guy Schickedanz married his first and only girlfriend, Faye Schneider, in 1935. They stressed education and a love of God to their four children, Larry, Jerry, Glen and Susan. All the children attended schools of higher education and in their extended family there are Ph.D's., a DVM, Masters, and Bachelor college degrees.

Guy and Faye have 12 grandchildren and 14 great grand children. Their dream is for all young people to follow their dreams of bettering themselves. If you listen closely, you can hear Faye say, "Isn't there something you can graduate in?" and Guy say, "I don't care if you want to punch cows for a living, but you're going to college first!"
